#### **Certificate Programs and Concentrations:**

**Department of Philosophy - Program on Values in Society -** <u>Graduate Certificate in Ethics</u>: The Program on Values in Society aims to facilitate graduate research in ethics as it arises across the disciplines. The program is designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary for integrating ethics and ethics scholarship into their chosen field. The graduate certificate program is only open to students already enrolled in other graduate degree programs at the University of Washington. Successful completion of the Certificate Program will be noted on official transcripts.

Evans School for Public Policy and Governance - International Development Policy and Management Certificate Program (IDCP): This certificate offers students a foundation for addressing complex questions of poverty and development. The goal of the certificate within the student's UW study is threefold: to understand the main debates, players, policies and values within international development; to be familiar with a common set of skills and applied approaches; and to appreciate the perspectives and methods that other disciplines bring to address current development challenges. The certificate is a cohort model that builds a network of individuals across campus with similar interests.

\*\*\*For information on additional courses focusing on international development that are offered throughout the university check out the "list of approved electives" also found on the IDCP certificate page. These are courses that GH students can take whether you choose to do the certificate or not.

Qualitative Methods Concentration (QUAL): QUAL is a UW-wide initiative launched in response to pressing demand for qualitative research design and methods training in the social sciences. QUAL aims to promote and systematize training in qualitative research methods and to build a community of qualitative multi-method researchers. The Initiative has the support of the <a href="Dean of the Division of Social Sciences">Dean of the Division of Social Sciences</a> and is guided by a <a href="Steering Committee">Steering Committee</a> of social science faculty at the University of Washington.
